She addressed the Board regarding a non-compete clause that she stated is on the employment application for many provider agencies in Medina County. Ms. Davis stated that there is an individual she has worked with for 10 years. His family would like to utilize reserve hours in his ISP. She stated that her previous employer called the parents of the individual and informed them that due to the non-compete clause, Ms. Davis is not able to provide services for this individual. Ms. Davis stated she believes that the non-compete clause contradicts Free Choice of Provider for individuals and families. She stated she is currently working with the CEO of The Arc to get this changed. The Board asked Ms. Davis a few questions, thanked her for bringing this to their attention, and offered to provide her with the contact information for the Medina County Ombudsman. Ms. Lees will provide this information to Ms. Davis.

**SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT****May, 2024****SSA**

- A majority of the SSA Department attended trainings at Ohio Means Jobs in Summit County, and at the Big Creek Center in Parma, on Cause and Contributing Factors/Prevention Plans for MUIs/UIRs.
- On 4/15, Brittny Kosinski and Nik Pokrzywa, Investigative Agents, facilitated a training on MUI/UIR processes and procedures at JFS, alongside their Child Protective Division, in an effort to continue educating and collaborating with community partners.

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

- On 4/19, MCBDD participated in the Fair Housing Awareness Day to answer questions and share information related to housing options for people with DD.
- On 4/26, MCBDD participated in the Brunswick High School Career Fair to promote careers in the DD field.
- On 4/27, MCBDD participated in the Medina County Transition Fair at the Independence Civic Center to share informational materials about transitions to adulthood.
- The Donated Funds Committee reviewed the applications for the 2024 Donor Scholarship. Congratulations to Connor Pugh, a Senior at the Medina County Career Center, who will be recognized at the May Board Meeting.

**EARLY INTERVENTION**

- Referrals were up in the month of April with 41 new referrals; the highest monthly referrals to date for this fiscal year.
- A series of live webinars have been scheduled to train EI staff on the new rule.
- There will also be short YouTube videos on the EI website with training on each of the 18 EI forms.
- We are awaiting the SFY25 grant allocation for Medina County; the funding should be announced for our county soon.
- The DODD Family Questionnaire will go out to all families who had an active IFSP on a date in March; that mailing will include any family who has exited the program. EI staff have devised a plan to increase parent responses and improve ratings with some additional education for parents about the intent of some of the questions. For example, one question families are asked is, "Do you understand your parent rights?"; the parent rights brochure is reviewed with families repeatedly throughout the EI process; however, they don't seem to make the connection between the question and the brochure.

**SCHOOL AGE AND PRESCHOOL**

- On 5/2, the Windfall School Art Fest was held with an "Under the Sea" theme.
- On 5/7, all Windfall school-age students participated in the All-County Track and Field Day at Cloverleaf High School.

- The Windfall Preschool and High School Graduation is 5/24. We have 10 preschool students completing their program and two high school students graduating.

- We discussed several topics this month including the following:

  - In TV and movies, characters with disabilities are now actually being played by actors with that disability. These genuine representations are steps in the right direction.
- \*Companies moving in the right direction include: a fully accessible theme park in Texas that has done recent renovations to be even more inclusive; Chewy is helping train autism service dogs; sporting goods companies are being more inclusive with their models and mannequins; however, not when it comes to someone with a running blade being able to only buy the shoe they need.
  - We also did a small personal space lesson, gave some reminders about Mother's Day to remember to show appreciation for your mom/mother figure/mentor in your life, and reminded people that Memorial Day is coming up with parades and picnics.
  - Our next meeting will be held 5/28 at 10:30-11:15 a.m. and 5:30-6:15 p.m.

### **• Curriculum Training at Medina County Career Center**

- The Advocacy Curriculum training at the Medina County Career Center for Mrs. Wendt's class just received their completion certificates at our final class on Monday, 4/15. On 5/18, Molly Usner, Community Resource Coordinator, had the honor of attending an appreciation luncheon at the Career Center with local business partners of the transition

students, where she received a plaque for her dedication and commitment to their students and their futures.

- **People Together Program**

- We are actively working on recruiting more Advocates to take part in the People Together program. Patti Hetkey, Community Relations Manager, and Angela Baratuci, Community Relations Specialist, are assisting in putting together promotional materials and have some wonderful ideas to boost recruitment. The next school presentation will be 5/10 at Hinckley and Buckeye Schools.

- **Leadership Academy:**

The 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Leadership Academy class began on 4/16 from 9:30 a.m. -11:30 a.m. Three of the four students were in attendance.

- We went over their planners and folders for handouts. Together we created guidelines for the class, discussed what makes a good leader, and shared characteristics that leaders we admire possess.
- We had some fun with an activity of one participant leading another blindfolded participant through a maze of cones only using verbal direction to work on communication, listening skills, and trust.
- We were grateful to have Debbie Boehmke from Northern Medina County Chamber Alliance come and share valuable information on becoming a leader. Thank you to Stacey Maleckar, Superintendent, Annie Finnerty, Assistant Superintendent, and Shannon Lees, Executive Administrator, who came and shared supportive messages with our class as well.

- **The Improvaneer Method**

- We are currently registering individuals for our next session of Introduction to Improvisation classes, which will begin 6/3 from 6:00 - 7:15 p.m. In Improv, participants “build key advocacy skills in a very fun, game-centered, and group environment.” Through four key areas of development, participants gain confidence and build their advocacy skills. These areas are: Introductions to Improvisation, Self-Awareness Skills, Decision Making and Being Decisive, and Becoming a True Advocate.

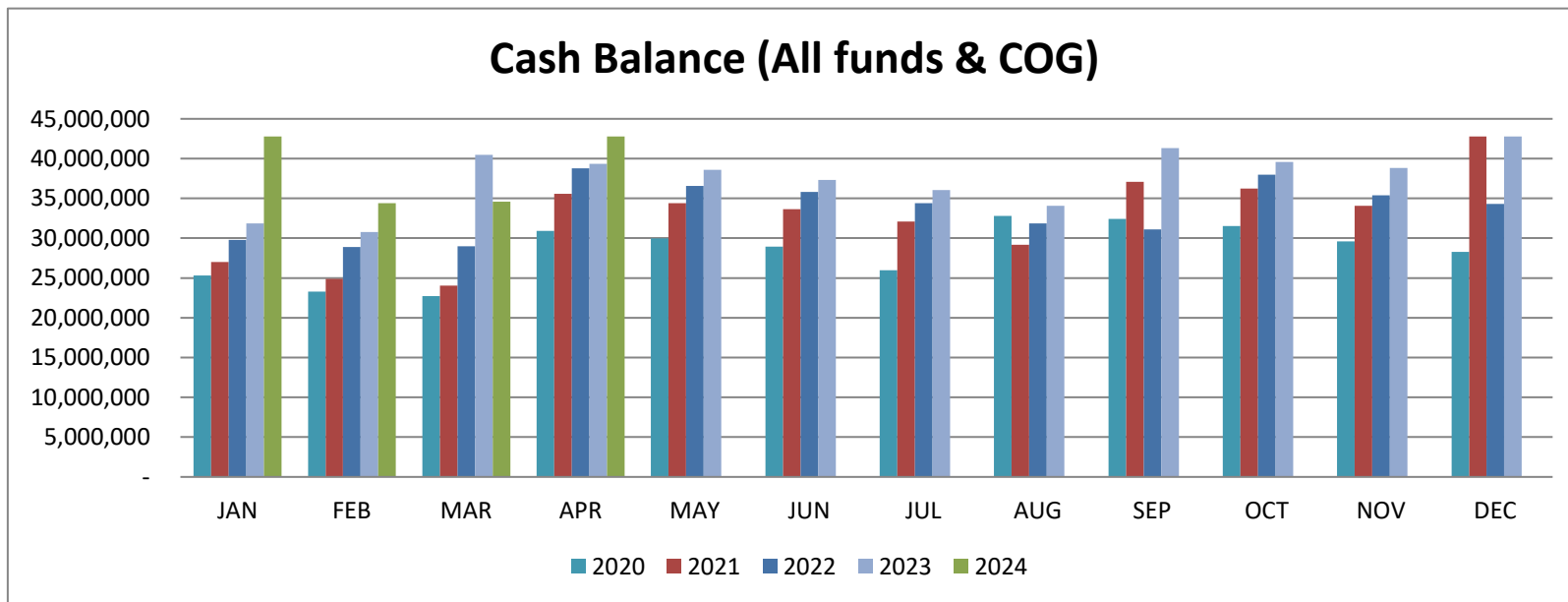

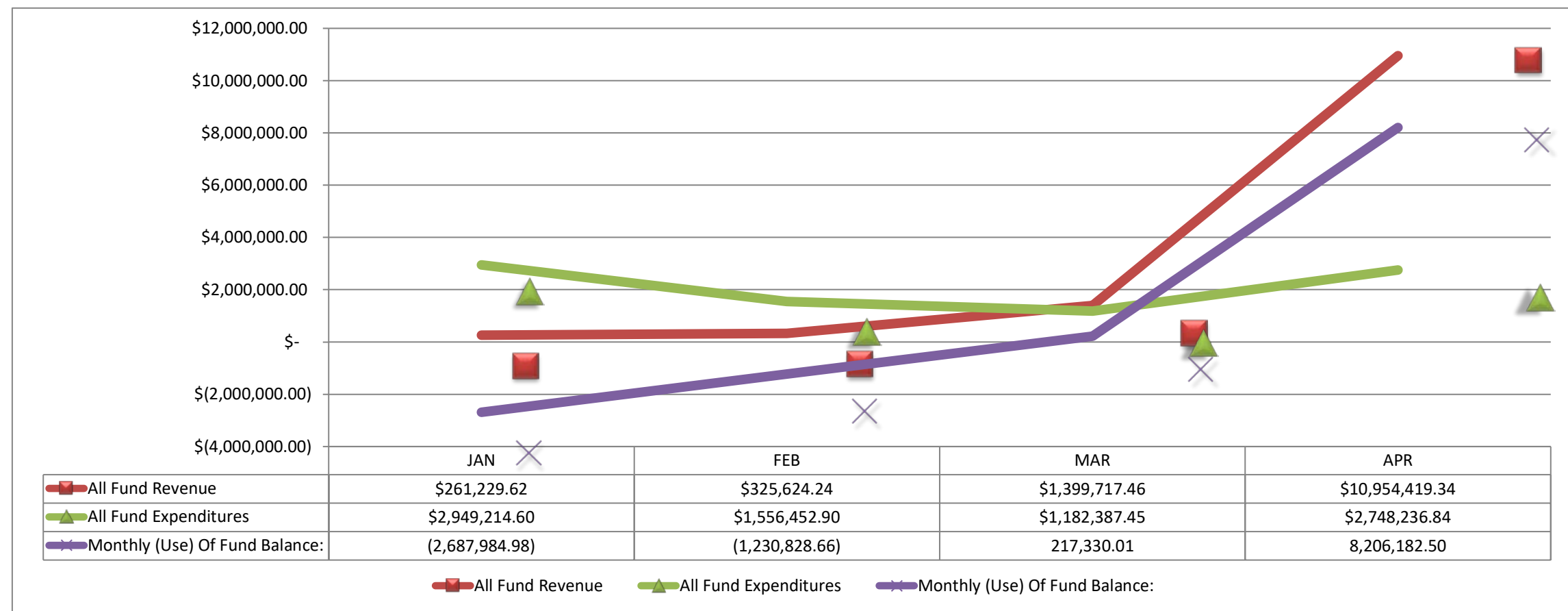

People with autism are reaching out into their communities to ask for more understanding, acceptance and help. They want their friends, neighbors and the community in general to look for and find new ways to include them into daily life. So, what do people with autism really want you to understand?

## 1 WE ARE ALL INDIVIDUALS

Autism affects everyone in different ways; if you've met one person with autism, you've only met one person with autism. Each of us is unique and different. And we are definitely not the stereotypes you see in popular culture, so please don't make assumptions that we are unfeeling robots, Rainman or savants.

## 2 WE HAVE HOBBIES, NOT SPECIAL INTERESTS

People with autism may hyper-focus on a certain subject and become an expert in it; particularly ones we are comfortable with and interested in. Instead of singling this out, our hobbies should be nurtured (into fulfilling careers if possible), and not treated as just unimportant special interests.

## 3 UNDERSTAND WHY WE STIM

People with autism sense the world differently and may experience sensory overload. In response to this, some people with autism might stim. Stimming is a self-soothing behavior such as rocking, humming and fidgeting, which helps us process our surroundings, reduce anxiety and provide comfort. It is important to be open-minded and flexible when you see a person stimming, we are trying to fit into our community.

## 4 OUR COMMUNICA- TION MIGHT BE DIF- FERENT

For some people with autism, it is easier if sentences are kept short and simple. Others find it easier when key words and phrases are repeated. Sometimes people with autism do not communicate with words at all. This should never be mistaken for a lack of intelligence. Please be open-minded and try to find different ways to communicate meaningfully with us.

## 5 WE HAVE EMPATHY

Some people think that when you have autism, that you aren't empathetic or can't feel empathy, but this is wrong. In many cases, we actually feel overwhelming levels of empathy and other feelings, but we may not be able to express them in typical ways. Also, most of us prefer to say exactly what we mean and feel, but we might not realize this may upset you.

### BONUS TIP:

We need more autism-friendly environments and understanding - Although each of us experiences the world differently, more can be done to make everyday environments more autism-friendly. Simple adjustments such as low-level lighting or decreasing noise levels can make a difference. The best way you can support the autism community is to be flexible, and remember that everyone is unique with different interests, needs, habits, likes and dislikes.

The Medina County Fair Housing Office recently hosted a Fair Housing Awareness program held at the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities.

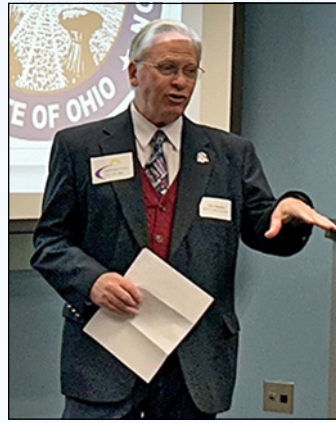

# Agency begins offering services to school district

Alternative Paths Chief Executive Officer Nikole Hosking reports in early April, the agency began providing Mental Health and Substance Use services in the Brunswick City School District — specifically in the middle and high schools.

Alternative Paths, Inc. is a private, non-profit behavioral health agency, founded in 1989.

It was established in Medina County with a focus on providing services to adult individuals with severe and persistent mental illness, such as depression, bi-polar



disorder, and schizophrenia.

Alternative Paths has also served as Medina County's 24/7 Crisis and Behavioral Health Hotline, assisting individuals in psychiatric emergency situations.

While the agency retains its specialty in working with individuals

with severe and persistent mental illness, in more recent years, the agency has expanded its array of behavioral healthcare services to include services for adult individuals with less severe mental health needs and substance use disorders.

In addition to their adult services, the agency also offers youth mental health and substance use disorder treatment for youth ages 5-18.

The agency also offers outpatient services as well as intensive home-based treatment services for youth.

# 'DSP University' graduates first class

On April 11, the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities – in partnership with the Medina County Career Center and the Ohio Alliance of Direct Support Professionals – celebrated the first graduating class of the new Direct Support Professional University program at the Career Center.

“Each of this year’s graduates showed such a personal desire to make a positive impact on the lives of people with developmental differences,” said MCBDD Superintendent Stacy Maleckar. “I expect to see great things from these graduates in the future.”

Also known as “DSP-U,” this program gives MCCC students who enroll an opportunity to learn about a career in a field that is in desperate need of quality professional workers. It helps students learn how to provide services and daily support to help people with disabilities succeed in meeting their life goals and dreams.

According to US Department of Labor statistics, direct service professionals are one of the most in-demand jobs in America and the need for qualified professionals to fill a large number

of full-time jobs will only continue to increase over the next several years.

DSP-U is nationally recognized and accredited in Ohio by the Department of Education as a pathway to graduation. Students participating in the DSP-U program experience specialized training, on-site, hands-on internships, and the opportunity to earn their professional credentials while receiving credit toward high school graduation requirements.

By aligning this project’s internships with existing direct service provider agencies in Medina – such as Intervention for Peace and the MCBDD’s own Windfall School – they now have access to a pool of qualified candidates who have already been specifically trained and certified.

“DSP-U is such a great opportunity to ignite a passion for the opportunities and rewards young adults can find in helping people with disabilities,” said Pam Wheeler, MCBDD Health Services Coordinator. “I am already looking forward to helping those involved in next year’s program find the same success and dedication for helping people with disabilities.”

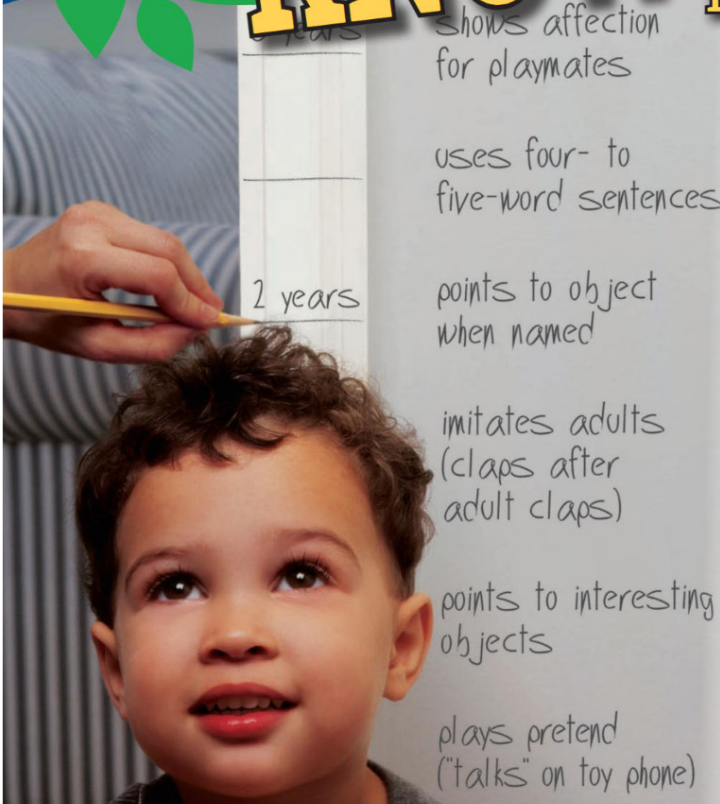

# KNOW All the Ways Your Child Grows



**Height and weight** - they are the two ways we may use to keep track of a child's growth. The truth is growth can be measured in many ways. In fact, in the first three years of life, a child's brain develops faster than at any other time. That is why early moments matter in their development.

The way young children talk, play and interact with others gives important clues about their development. Experts call these developmental milestones. A developmental delay is when a child does not reach milestones in the same basic age range as other children.

Doctors will check developmental milestones at well-child visits or if a parent contacts them with concerns about their child's development. If a concern does arise, a health care professional will use a screening to look for possible delays. If a screening confirms any concerns, it may lead to the need to contact an early intervention services program for help.

Although parents may have fears about labeling a child, the earlier help is found, the better the chance for improving a child's future success. The good news is with early action, doctors, parents and early intervention specialists can work together to give a child the best chance to getting back on the path to reaching developmental milestones.

### - Services for Young Children Sees 45% Increase

Since December 2020, the MCBDD has seen an increase of 45% for Early Intervention Services for young children ages 0-3. Early Intervention is a set of services to help babies and toddlers with delays or disabilities learn or catch-up on basic skills that typically develop during the first three years of life.

MCBDD's Early Intervention services, helps with:

- Physical and occupational therapy for motor skills like crawling and walking.
- Speech therapy for communication skills such as talking and listening.
- Behavioral therapy for social and emotional skills like playing, coping and being happy.

### - Learn, Play and Grow Playgroup

Children are children regardless of where they are in their development. They all like to learn, explore, and grow through play. That is why the MCBDD has created its free "Play, Learn and Grow" community playgroup. The playgroup gives young families a chance to meet, form connections and share their experiences and challenges of raising toddlers.

During each event, MCBDD's has chances for sensory play, songs, toddler activities, early childhood development information and, of course, snacks!

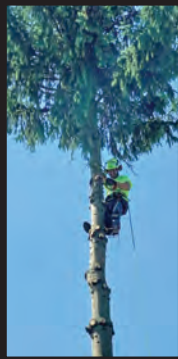
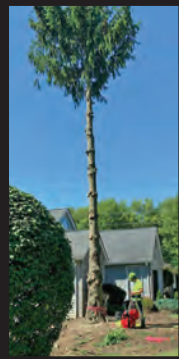

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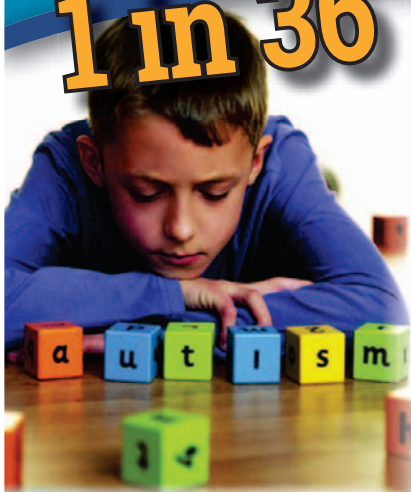

### April is Autism Acceptance Month

As people and families affected by autism know, acceptance is often one of the biggest barriers to being involved in the community. Autism acceptance asks the community to begin from a place of understanding and knowing all people are not the same and everyone has abilities and some imperfections. Acceptance looks at what we have in common and what strengths we share.

- Autism usually appears before a child is 3 years old, while some signs may be evident as early as 10 months.
- It can be hard to diagnose, because symptoms range from mild to severe and are different for every child.
- It is important parents know developmental milestones for their children and discuss any concerns with their doctor.
- A child with autism should begin early intervention services as soon as possible when they are diagnosed.

# Treasurer's Office creating land bank

Medina County Treasurer John Burke announced he will prepare and file incorporation papers with the State of Ohio to create a Medina County Land Revitalization Corporation (LRC).

Commonly referred to as a land bank or LRC, Ohio law allows land banks to acquire vacant and abandoned properties through tax foreclosure and donations and return it to productive use.

According to Burke, by establishing a land bank, Medina County can take advantage of new grants offered for the first time by the State of Ohio through the Welcome Home Ohio Program.

This grant program allows land banks to purchase, rehab, or build qualifying residential properties for income-eligible residents. Additionally, there are nonrefundable tax credits made to land banks and eligible developers for qualifying rehabs and new construction once the property is sold.

"This is an Ohio initiative offered only to land banks," Burke said. "That could mean about \$1 million in grants for Medina County to improve our housing and allow more residents to access affordable housing."

Burke said he has closely observed the development of land banks in Ohio from inception in 2009 lead by former Cuyahoga County Treasurer Jim Rokakis and the County Treasurer's Association of Ohio, of which Burke is a member.

"At that time, during the housing crisis, it provided a way to tackle the blight of abandoned and vacant homes in the big cities like Cleveland," Burke said.

Burke explained that Medina County has never had similar blight. Last year he reported that the County only had 37 prosecutor-initiated tax delinquent property foreclosures which were sold at sheriff sale. Those properties not sold at sheriff sale go to the county auditor to sell for the amount of tax delinquency or less.

Burke reported there were only four properties in the last county auditor sale.

"Consequently, there are few opportunities here in Medina County for a land bank to do their normal property acquisition demolition and resale. But now Ohio has new opportunities for land banks to invest in affordable housing which is needed according to a recent county-wide housing survey" Burke said.

Burke, County Commissioner Steve Hambley, Economic Development Executive Director Bethany Dentler and a task force of other community leaders have been meeting over the past few months to consider policies and a strategic plan for a land bank in Medina County.

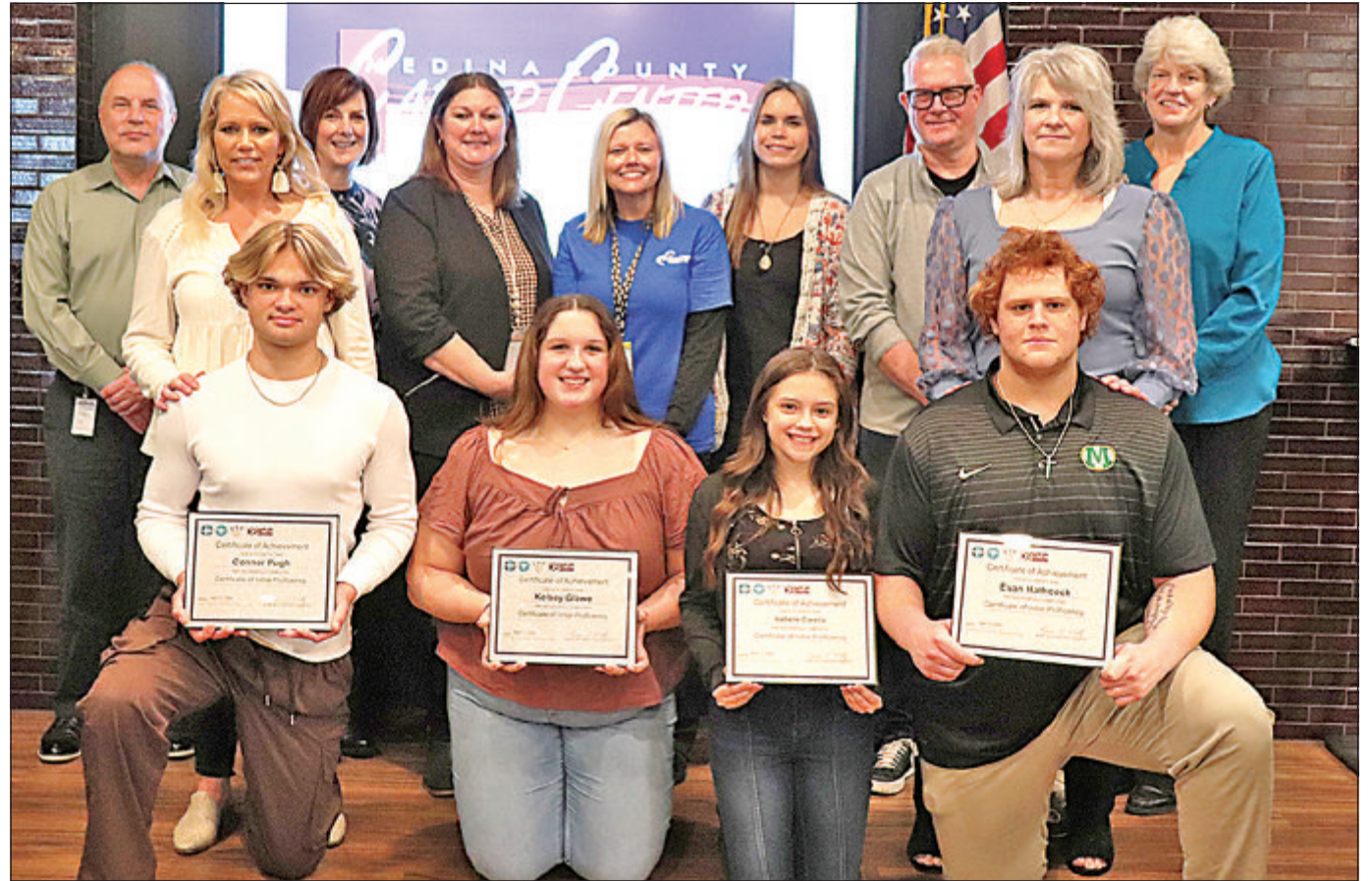

On April 11, the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities, in partnership with the Medina County Career Center and the Ohio Alliance of Direct Support Professionals, celebrated the first class of students to graduate from the new Direct Support Professional University program — also known as DSP-U — at the Career Center.

"Each of this year's graduates showed such a personal desire to make a positive impact on the lives of people with developmental differences," MCBDD Superintendent Stacey Maleckar said. "To see the next generation of professionals embrace, grow and learn about our field is truly inspiring. I expect to see great things from these graduates in the future."

The DSP-U program gives MCCC students who enroll an opportunity to learn about a career in a field that needs quality professional workers. The program helps students learn how to provide services and daily support to help people with disabilities succeed in meeting their life goals and dreams.

DSP-U is nationally recognized, and accredited in Ohio by the Department of Education, as a pathway to graduation. Students taking part in the DSP-U program experience specialized training, on-site, hands-on internships and the opportunity to earn their professional credentials while receiving credit toward high school graduation requirements.

The program offers those who complete the training a Certificate of Initial Proficiency, which requires the completion of 20 courses for 60 classroom hours, besides a minimum of 100 intern-

ship hours. Upon completion of the program, the graduates already have the credentials they need to apply immediately for jobs as direct service professionals.

"DSP-U is such a great opportunity to ignite a passion for the opportunities and rewards young adults can find in helping people with disabilities," MCBDD Health Services Coordinator Pam Wheeler said. "Working over the last several months with these students, the teachers at the Career Center, and the staff of OADSP has been a great experience and I am already looking forward to helping those involved in next year's program find the same success and dedication for helping people with disabilities."

Students participating in the DSP-U program experience specialized training, on-site, hands-on internships, and the opportunity to earn their professional credentials while receiving credit toward high school graduation requirements. DSP-U offers those who complete the training a Certificate of Initial Proficiency (CIP) which requires the completion of 20 courses for a total of 60 classroom hours, in addition to a minimum of 100 internship hours. Upon completion of the program, the graduates already have the credentials they need to immediately apply for jobs as direct service professionals.

By aligning this project’s internships with existing direct service provider agencies in Medina such as Intervention for Peace and the MCBDD’s own Windfall School, the program created a win-win environment. Provider agencies now have access to a pool of qualified candidates who have already been specifically trained and certified. This will help address the existing direct support professional vacancy gap while increasing the quality of service providers available in Medina County.
