Regular Board Meeting Minutes July 22, 2024

I. Call to Order

The MCBDD Regular Board Meeting was called to order by Board President Andy Olah at 5:03 p.m. Other Board Members present included the following: Dave Hartman, Mark Gryskiewicz, Sandra Thomas Fain, Ann Salek, Lisa Dreaden, and Wayne Carroll (arrived at 5:07 p.m.).

Staff present included the following: Stacey Maleckar, Annie Finnerty, Shannon Lees, Diana Davis, Sabrina Johnson, Carey Bates, Tracey Lambdin, Patti Hetkey, Bobby Richards, Ed Dryer, and John Krebs.

Others present included the following: Keisha Thomas.

II. General Session

A. Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

B. Mission Statement Affirmation

The Mission Statement was recited.

C. Recognitions

1. Retirement – Sharon Horn

Stacey Maleckar, Superintendent, read the Retirement Proclamation for Sharon Horn. Ms. Horn was not in attendance. Ms. Horn has been with the MCBDD for 39 years and was instrumental in developing the Safety Town Plus+ program, as well as the preschool program. She will be greatly missed. The Board wished Ms. Horn the very best in her upcoming retirement.

D. Approval of Minutes

1. Approval of the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting, June 24, 2024

A Motion was made by Mr. Hartman, seconded by Mr. Gryskiewicz, to approve the Minutes from the Regular Board Meeting on June 24, 2024. Ms. Thomas Fain abstained. All others voted "yes." The Motion was approved.

E. Presentation

Sabrina Johnson, Director of SSA, and Ed Dryer, Director of Community Supports, presented to the Board. Information regarding the following was shared:

- Definition of Assistive Technology vs. Remote Supports
- What has been done to increase the use of Remote Supports
- Where we are now in regard to increasing Remote Supports
- The MCBDD Lending Library: options and process
- The MCBDD Smart Home: items and visitors

- The Medina/Summit Tech Expo (9/26/24)
- Visible results regarding use of Assistive Tech and Remote Supports

Questions from the Board included the following topics:

- Q: Who is reviewing this, legally?
- A: The provider is responsible for implementation and training. Remote Supports are based on assessed need. SSAs are responsible for conducting Continuous Reviews, and if there was any kind of incident, the MUI process would be used to investigate and remedy.
- Q: In light of the recent computer system failure, is there something in place for a backup to a remote monitoring system?
- A: The Team for each individual will have backups in place.
- Q: Have the schools been contacted about this option?
- A: Yes; and a "Save the Date" has been sent to the schools for the Tech Expo.
- Q: Is there first responder training for this?
- A: Not currently; however, Ms. Maleckar is going to be meeting with representatives of local law enforcement to discuss first responder training. Most departments have a form that can be filled out when there is a person with a disability living in a home, but we would like to see a uniform form used across all law enforcement agencies.
- Q: Are remote support communications between the individual and the provider encrypted?
- A: Safeguards are in place by the manufacturer, as with any other system. In addition, because this is a waiver service, there are some other standards that must be met, by rule.

At this time, Mr. Olah stated that there will be an Executive Session at the end of the meeting for Personnel Matters.

Mr. Hartman requested a discussion regarding the article in the Gazette about grant money being used for the building that used to be the MCBDD bus garage. Mr. Olah called Point of Order and asked if the discussion could be moved to end of the Reports section of the Agenda. Mr. Hartman agreed.

G. New Business

1. ProDoor & Security Door Replacements Resolution #24-24 (ACTION)

A Motion was made by Ms. Thomas Fain, seconded by Mr. Hartman, to approve Resolution #24-24 to authorize the Superintendent to accept the quotes with ProDoor & Security for door replacements – C11-C12-C13. The quotes for the scope of work shall not exceed: \$26,494.55. The main purpose of this project is to replace (3) exterior building doors (C11-C12-C13). This project is included in the Capital Improvements budget. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

H. Reports Review

 - ➤ Ms. Maleckar reviewed the Superintendent's Report. Additional topics discussed included the following:
 - o The Cost Projection Tool dashboard is now on the DODD website.

- o The Momentum Refresh vehicle was used at the Taste of Wadsworth event and was very successful. It will also be used at the fair. We must book 6-8 weeks in advance.
- o Since the ESC is not using the school side for ESY (extended school year) this year, we were able to make needed updates to the classrooms and restrooms.
- Financial Reports Ms. Bates reviewed the following:
 - > Revenue
 - o \$50K State Capital Grant.
 - o \$11,115.20 State Grant FY24 (law tech safety): used to purchase five phase 2 radios that go directly to dispatch and replace the old MARCS radios.
 - o Donations: \$673.93 from Ice Cream Social toward Special Events fund.
 - > Expenditures
 - o June was a two-pay month.
 - o Travel includes the OACB Spring Conference & trainings: Operating \$4,486.92 and Training \$8,539.32.
 - o Special Projects provider support programs and DODD ARPA grant expenses.
 - o Utilities no electric paid in June (was paid July 1).
 - o \$3,454.80 blinds for school office (decreased payment due to grant money).
 - o Match for five individuals in a developmental center.
 - No concerns.
 - Cash Balance
 - o \$40.7M fund balance.
 - Cash Flow
 - o \$940,711.21 used of fund balance.
 - Voucher Report
 - o Board Member questions were addressed.

Voucher Report(s) & Resolution #25-24 (ACTION)

A Motion was made by Mr. Carroll, seconded by Ms. Salek, to approve Resolution #25-24 to approve the Financial Reports for June, 2024. The Motion was approved with a unanimous "yes" vote.

 - ➤ Fiscal Indicators question raised regarding increase in percentage for MCBDD's local match responsibility. Increase is due to the rate increase. Another increase occurred at the beginning of July.
 - ➤ Performance Outcomes question raised regarding whether this report has led to anything that needs to be addressed in 2025. Ms. Maleckar stated it has not.

In regard to Mr. Hartman's earlier question about the grant funds being used to renovate the building that used to be the MCBDD bus garage, Ms. Maleckar stated that that project is with MCA and we have nothing to do with it. Mr. Hartman's concern stems from the way the article is worded and that it appears that the MCBDD is the one obtaining the grant funds. Ms. Bates stated that sometimes it's the terminology used by the agency awarding the grant. Should the grant funds come to MCBDD by mistake, they would be returned to the sender. Ms. Bates assured Mr. Hartman that while the article may have been confusing, the grant documents will have the correct name. Mr. Carroll stated we need to keep our eye on the situation.

Mr. Carroll shared a disability pride flag used in his yard and stated it is a positive way to share info and start conversations about disability awareness.

Mr. Hartman gave kudos to Patti Hetkey for all the great articles in the Community Engagement section.





PAYMENT TERMS: Late Payments: Payments are due upon receipt of invoice. Late payment finance charges of 1.5% per billing cycle will begin to occur 21 days after invoice date and will continue to occur monthly.

ACCEPTANCE: This Agreement must be accepted and executed by Owner. No work will commence at the Project until Owner accepts this Agreement in writing. Any terms proposed in Owner's acceptance of this Agreement that add to, vary from, or conflict with the terms and conditions herein are hereby objected to and shall not apply.

LEGACY shall execute the entire work described in this Agreement, except to the extent specifically indicated to be the responsibility of others, or that otherwise are excluded from LEGACY's scope of work by this Agreement, as may be amended and supplemented.

This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the parties hereto and supersedes prior negotiations, representations, or agreements, either written or oral. In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and any other documents, this Agreement shall control in each case.

CONTRACT PRICE: The scope of work and contract price are set forth in this Agreement

CONTRACT MODIFICATIONS: The Scope of Work and Contract Price are subject to increase, but only upon the mutual written agreement of Owner and LEGACY, which shall be a condition precedent to LEGACY's performance of any additional work. In no event shall Owner be permitted to direct LEGACY to perform additional work beyond that which is included in the Agreement, absent a written change order executed by both parties.

In the event there is a change in the work necessitated by differing or changed conditions, schedule or sequence adjustments, or other factors not the responsibility of the LEGACY, then the prices set forth on the Agreement and Project schedule shall be equitably adjusted. In the absence of a lump sum for the extra work or delay costs, LEGACY shall be paid on a time and material cost plus basis at LEGACY's then prevailing labor and equipment rates, together with overhead and profit at margins established and acceptable to LEGACY.

Mechanical Attachment of any Kind on this roof system will require a fastener to penetrate the roof decking. - The MCBDD celebrated DSP Appreciation Month with the following: articles in local newspapers, yard signs, social media, DSP Spotlight nominations, and videos.



EARLY INTERVENTION:

- Referrals for the month of August (29) hold steady, but are a little below average for the last quarter.
- There have been a lot of revisions in the new forms that were published 7/5, which has made the process of consents for services and developing the family plan more challenging; however, staff have been flexible and have persisted to ensure appropriate services for families.

- The third Toddler Play Group of the year took place on 7/10 at the Fred Greenwood Park splashpad. Despite the unpredictable, and sometimes scary weather, the group was as successful as the situation allowed. Approximately 25 people attended including children, parents, siblings, and other family members. Thanks to all of the MCBDD staff who showed up to assist and offer support (Scott and Sarah!). The final Toddler Play Group of the year is scheduled for 9/23 at Mugrage Park.
- The EI Coordinator position has been filled. Taylor Schell, current EI/Windfall School lead Speech Therapist was selected by the committee. There were over 10 qualified applicants for the position. Six applicants took part in the interview process.
- EI staff are scheduled (9/23) for Brittco training with the Geauga County EI staff. The focus of this training is for staff to become proficient in the data entry process, system reports, and timeline compliance.

SCHOOL AGE

- **Fall Training:** Staff were engaged in several trainings to prepare for the arrival of students: a PBIS program for the classrooms (which includes school-wide incentives), a de-escalation program (Aegis) for new staff, a lifting refresher for all staff, and a refresher for IEP meetings and mandates.
- **Music Mondays**: Students are experiencing personal interactions with instruments and developing an understanding of cadence, volume, and sing-alongs.
- **Transitions:** Classroom staff have been working on transitions that are related to real world situations through social stories and specials throughout the day.
- Community Field Trips: Many of our students are going out in the community for instruction on daily living skills. Our first few trips are focusing on making a list for cooking, finding those items, and then using the "Life Skills Lab" to develop cooking skills.
- **Communication**: We streamlined communication systems that use common visuals to create routine and daily schedules allowing for smoother transitions throughout the day.

COMMUNITY SUPPORTS & DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

Community Partnerships

- **DSP-U** The 2nd class for the DSP-U program had its kickoff at the Medina County Career Center on 9/5. We are thrilled that six students from Medina County Career Center (MCCC) will be completing the program this school year. This partnership with OADSP, MCCC, MCBDD, and several providers is an exciting opportunity to bring new potential DSPs into the field. We want to recognize our internship partners this year: AC Passage, Medina Creative Accessibility, Intervention for Peace, and Windfall School.
- Interactive Tech Expo On 9/26, MCBDD will be partnering with Summit County Board of DD and We Thrive Together to put on an Interactive Tech Expo at Summit Mall. This event will have over 40 vendors that include a variety of non-profits, agencies, and professionals that will offer interactive supportive technology. In addition, a total of seven presenters will demonstrate how assistive technology can assist individuals throughout the life span. This will also include a musical performance by Hearts of Music.

Imagine this: You come home and your front door, sensing your presence, automatically unlocks for you. You walk in carrying bags of groceries and as you enter the kitchen the lights turn on. You put your groceries away and realize that you forgot an item, so you send a request to your grocery store for a delivery using a touchscreen built into your refrigerator. You sit down in your living room to watch television and the thermostat automatically senses a chill in the air and increases the temperature of your home to keep you comfortable. When you go to bed at 10:00 pm, you pull the covers up over your head and your bedroom lights automatically dim. As you listen carefully, you can hear the click of your doors automatically locking for the night.


Does this sound like a scene from a futuristic sci-fi movie? Believe it or not, this smart home technology already exists. Some of the greatest opportunities that smart home technology offers are for the elderly and people with disabilities, for whom living at home can pose daily struggles.

Smart home technology can allow seniors and other adults with disabilities live in their own homes with less fear or restriction, giving them a sense of freedom and confidence. The impact that such conveniences can have is maybe felt greatest for those that suffer from age-related or developmental disabilities. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), it's estimated that one out of every five adults in the United States is living with a disability. The most common disabilities include: hearing and visual difficulty, speech or language difficulty, cognitive difficulty, walking difficulty, arthritis, and self-care difficulty like dressing or bathing. For each of these difficulties, life-simplifying smart-home technology advancements are allowing individuals to remain comfortably, and safely, in their own homes—where they most want to be.

Today budget-friendly technology that nearly anyone can afford is able to be retrofitted into almost any home with the expertise of the right contractor or solution provider. From a homeowner perspective, a smart home provides comfort, security, safety, accessibility, energy efficiency, and convenience through the use of appliances, lighting, electronic equipment, heating and cooling systems, entertainment systems, and home security solutions. In a smart home. all such devices can be controlled remotely by a computer

or mobile device with Internet access, or preset using a schedule. Many smart home solutions can also accept voice commands for the ultimate in-home convenience. They can even be customized on a room-by-room basis.

In Medina County, the Medina County Board of DD has a Smart Room that has a host of smart home technologies that people are able to try out to see if what works for an individual situation. The room is a mock "home" set up to demonstrate a wide variety of technologies available to help a person be more independent within their home. Some of the technologies include a remote monitoring system, smart kitchen devices, Alexa, remote-controlled doors, and much more. "To see the next generation of professionals, embrace, grow and learn about our field is truly inspiring. I expect to see great things from these students in the future."

The DSP-U program gives MCCC students who enroll an opportunity to learn about a career in a field that is in desperate need of quality professional workers. It helps students learn how to give daily support to help people with disabilities succeed in meeting their life goals and dreams. According to US Department of Labor statistics, direct service professionals are one of the most in-demand jobs in America and the need for qualified professionals to fill a large number of full-time jobs will only continue to increase over the next several years.


DSP-U is nationally recognized, and accredited in Ohio by the Department of Education, as a pathway to graduation. Students participating in the DSP-U program experience specialized training, on-site, hands-on internships, and the opportunity to earn their professional credentials while receiving credit toward high school graduation requirements. DSP-U offers those who complete the training a Certificate of Initial Proficiency (CIP) which requires the completion of 20 courses for a total of 60 classroom hours, in addition to a minimum of 100 internship hours. Upon completion of the program, the graduates already have the credentials they need to immediately apply for jobs as direct service professionals.

"DSP-U is such a great opportunity to ignite a passion for the rewards young adults can find in helping people with disabilities," said Pam Wheeler, MCBDD Health Services Coordinator and the person responsible for bringing this program into Medina County. "With the help of the outstanding teachers at the Career Center, and the staff of OADSP, I am so excited that we are able to offer a second year of such a great learning experience

- **Use sun protection.** One of the key ways to care for the skin is to protect it from the sun. Over time, sun exposure can cause age spots, wrinkles and elevate the risk for skin cancer. Always use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher. Apply generously and be sure to reapply every two hours or more if you will be swimming or perspiring.
- Stay away from tanning beds. People mistakenly think that using tanning beds is safer than sitting out in the sun. However, tanning beds emit harmful UV radiation that can

cause skin cancer just like the sun. The AAD says one indoor tanning session can increase the risk of developing melanoma by 20 percent. Use self-tanning products instead for a golden glow.

- Quit smoking or never begin. Smoking makes the skin look older and contributes to wrinkles. Smoking narrows the tiny blood vessels in the outermost layers of the skin, decreasing blood flow to the skin and making the skin more pale, says the Mayo Clinic. Smoking also depletes oxygen in the skin and can damage collagen and elastin, the fibers that give skin its elasticity and strength.
- Avoid an overload of products. Many dermatologists suggest their patients stick to the basics daily, which includes a mild cleanser, moisturizer and sunscreen. Drinking plenty of water also helps the skin. Exfoliating the skin once a week can help remove dead skin cells, but don't overdo it, which can lead to excess oil production and breakouts.
- Select the right products for your skin type. Choose products that pertain to your skin type, which may be sensitive, normal, dry, oily, or a combination thereof.
- Don't forget the lips. Many people treat their entire faces but then do not address the skin on their lips. Skin cancer can form on the lips, so use a lip balm that has an SPF of 30 or higher. Petroleum jelly can add moisture to the lips if they feel dry.
- Visit a dermatologist. A dermatologist is an expert in many conditions of the skin, hair and nails. He or she can perform an annual examination to look at the entire body and determine the health of skin, and identify any moles or spots that may be of concern.
- Check your own skin. People are advised to pay attention to their skin and look regularly for new spots; spots that are different from other spots on the body; moles that itch, bleed or change color; and any other things that seem not quite right.

Taking care of the skin throughout the years can help a person look and feel his or her best.

Pregnancy and Alcohol Don't Mix Why Take the Risk?

For over two decades, the call has gone out every year on the ninth day of the ninth month warning women about the dangers of drinking while pregnant, yet Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS) remains stubbornly below the national radar. In fact, an estimated 1% to 5% of U.S. first graders have FASD, according to a National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA)-supported study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Almost 35 years after the U.S. Surgeon General began warning women about alcohol-related brain damage in newborns, the disorder still is not as recognized as autism, epilepsy or other developmental disorders.

What are fetal alcohol spectrum disorders?

Fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASDs) is the name given to a group of conditions that a person can have if that person's mother drank alcohol while she was pregnant. Alcohol exposure during pregnancy can interfere with development of the baby's brain and other critical organs and physiological functions. This may cause conditions which include physical and intellectual disabilities, as well as problems with behavior and learning. Often, a person has a mix of these problems. FASDs are one of the leading known causes of developmental disability and birth defects.

What are some signs of FASDs?

Signs of FASDs can be physical or intellectual. That means they can affect the mind or the body or both. Because FASDs makes up a group of disorders, people with FASDs can show a wide range and mix of signs. Physical signs of FASDs can include abnormal facial features such as narrow eye openings and a smooth ridge between the upper lip and nose, small head size, short stature, and low body weight. Rarely, problems with the heart, kidneys, bones or hearing might be present. Intellectual and behavioral signs of FASDs might

include problems with memory, judgment or impulse control, motor skills, and academics (especially in math, paying attention and low IQ). Specific learning disabilities are also possible

What can I do if I think my child has an FASD?

Talk to your child's doctor or nurse. If you or the doctor thinks there could be a problem, ask to see a specialist, someone who knows about FASDs such as a developmental pediatrician, child psychologist, or clinical geneticist. Although parents may have concerns about labeling a child, the earlier a FASD diagnosis is made, the better the chance for improving a child's future success. The good news is with early detection, the sooner professionals and parents can work together to equip kids to make sense of the world.



Did you know?

Scars can develop if an injury is not treated properly or you didn't think a cut was deep enough to necessitate treatment. Scars also may develop after surgery or another medical procedure. Scars may be dark marks, which are pink, red or brown patches that result from post-inflammatory hyperpigmentation. Cuts, burns and other injuries to the skin, including acne, can contribute to hyperpigmentation. Certain scars may fade and become less noticeable on their own, but there are other ways to speed the process along. Dark scars can be made less visible after the application of topical treatments, such as those with salicylic acid or glycolic acid peels, which help promote cell turnover, advises the beauty experts at Good Housekeeping. At-home topical brightening ingredients are another option that can be discussed with a dermatologist. In terms of textured scars, which may be depressed or raised areas on the skin, microneedling or dermaroller treatments may help to diminish these scars at home. Individuals with deep, dark scars may need to seek the help of a dermatologist, who may recommend therapies that can use light, peels and fills to make scars less visible.

n the surface, Mary Shelley's "Frankenstein" and Jane Austen's "Pride and Prejudice" couldn't be more different.

Someone who can offer a keen perspective on the connective tissue between the two 19th-century books is Michael Barakiva, who was recently named Cleveland Play House artistic director.

Not only did he direct the Cleveland Play House's former 2023 production but after taking over the Tony Award-winning company this year he'll be helming the latter, which appears through Sept. 29 in the Allen Theatre.

"On the first day of rehearsal for 'Pride and Prejudice,' I talked about 'Frankenstein' a bunch," he said.

"Jane Austen died in 1817 and 'Frankenstein' was published 1818. It's amazing to think about a society that was capable of producing two such brilliant women whose aes-

Aside from the fact as the new Cleveland Play House artistic director he could literally make that happen (consider the gauntlet thrown), Barakiva it turns out is quite the Austen fan to the point where he considers himself a stalker of the influential author.

Unprompted, the veteran director and writer — who for decades staged new plays, revivals and classics in New York City and around the country — delivered a beloved "Pride and Prejudice" line: "It is a truth univer-

sally acknowledged that a single man in possession of a good fortune must be in want of a wife." "After reading the book for the first time when I was a sophomore in high school, I became obsessed with Jane Austen,"

"Then my sophomore year of college, I took a seminar and we read everything that Jane Austen wrote the six novels and unfinished novels and most amazingly the letters where you get to see really inside of her soul and how hilarious and wicked she really was.'

Despite his love affair with "Pride and Prejudice," Barakiva never directed the familiar tale detailing the love affair between Elizabeth Bennet and Fitzwilliam Darcy.

However, he did previously at another theater produce Kate Hamill's adaptation, which is what the Cleveland Play House will be presenting.

"Kate is one of the 10 most produced playwrights of this country for the last 10 years," he said.

"She's also a brilliant, hilarious feminist mind. And she does this great thing where she keeps totally true to the source material while elevating it with a level of modernity and hilarity.

"It touches every single sweet spot I have, which is why I chose to have it be the first piece that I like directed here as artistic director.'

As far as his artistic vision for the iconic company, Barakiva said it's going to be a process of discovery.

"We're really starting to figure things out, aesthetically," he said. "That's something that's going to take more time as we balance new work with classical work with musicals

thermal imaging camera. Thanks to private donations, he said the department was able to purchase a medical utility task vehicle (UTV) and a rescue bed insert that equip the department to handle rescues in rugged terrain, including Whipps Ledges, the park system and local farmlands.

"This [helps] us get injured people to the hospital safely and much faster," he said. "It also reduced the labor-intensive removal out of those areas. The very first week the UTV was placed in service, it was used twice, including 24 hours after the board of trustees accepted the donation from the Hinckley Fireman's Association."

During Grossenbaugh's tenure, the department was also able to lower the township's ISO insurance rating.

"All of the hard work and dedication of hours of training, maintenance of equipment and much more helped us secure this improved rating," he said. A lower rating suggests to insurance providers that an insure home is at a lower risk of fire damage and that the area where the home is located in well-equipped to prevent, mitigate and extinguish fires, according to the outgoing chief. ∞





"We all have different questions to ask," she said.

Trustee Cyntia Engleman welcomed the idea, noting that she believes having the input of all three trustees would be beneficial.

"When it comes to full-time positions, we don't have too many of them in the township," she said, noting that having all three trustees participate in the hiring of the township's full-time zoning inspector turned out to be fruitful.

Grossenbaugh said the department received 12 applications. That number was whittled down to seven candidates, then to the final five, whom the department and trustees planned to interview July 26. He said along with himself, the township's assistant fire chief and lieutenant, three other fire chiefs from Brunswick, Seville and Lafayette took part in the preliminary interviews.

"We had a lot of experience [on the panel] and an actual stakeholder [as one of the chiefs is a Hinckley resident]," he said.

Fireworks

Grossenbaugh also reported that this was the second year fireworks were legally permitted in the township on the Fourth of July holiday and said there were no incidents or injuries reported.

"We had more responses, I thought, when [setting off fireworks] was illegal because of people complaining," he said. "[In one previous year, for example] we had one [resident] who set up a large display with consumer-grade fireworks on Ridge Road and somebody called that in. We had to call in the fire marshal in and dispose of all of it on July 5 on a hot summer day. But since it's been legal, we've been very, very lucky."

Facebook policy

In other news, trustees approved a resolution adopting an official social media policy for the township, effective July 16. Not only does the resolution stipulate that all posts on the township's Facebook page be maintained in accordance with the township record retention schedule, but it also requires that all topics to be posted on the site receive prior trustee approval.

Additionally, the resolution requires all events be marked as events; commenting and messaging functions be turned off; and ensures all posts are sharable to allow for maximum circulation. ∞



Recognizing vision problems We Remember. in kids

Although vision loss is typically associated with aging, people of all ages can experience issues that contribute to diminished vision. Sometimes parents may be unaware that their children have low vision or other issues compromising their sight, particularly when children are too young to verbalize their impairments. The Mayo Clinic notes additional symptoms, such as squinting while reading or holding reading material closely may be more apparent.

Parents, caregivers and even teachers can keep an eye out for these symptoms to determine if kids are having vision problems.

- **Blurriness:** A child may complain of things being blurry, whether that means words in a book or on a smart screen in the classroom.
- Headaches: Straining to see better can cause headaches. If a child starts complaining of frequent headaches, an eye exam may be in order.
- · Attention span: If your child quickly loses interest in games or other lengthy activities, it may be that poor vision is making it more difficult to fully partic-
- Losing place: Someone with vision issues may experience difficulty keeping track of words while reading.



- · Eye rubbing: Prevent Blindness says rubbing tired eyes can be an indicator of a vision problem, as can tilting one's head or thrusting the head forward.
- · Feeling dizzy: Some people with vision problems feel dizzy or out of sorts at times.
- · Physical symptoms: Sometimes vision problems may be apparent because you can see there is something amiss. Eyes that don't line up, eyes that appear crossed, redness in the eyes or rims, or red, inflamed eyes can be symptomatic of a vision problem.

• Eye exam results: Eye doctors conduct a series of tests during an eye exam. During an automatic refraction test, visual acuity can be measured when an autorefractor shines light into the eye and measures the eye's response. It's commonly used with children who cannot communicate what they're seeing and can help diagnose vision trouble.

Vision issues can present themselves in children and not be as readily apparent to the adults in their lives. Familiarizing oneself with certain symptoms is a way to diagnose vision trouble earlier.

We Honor. We Hope.

August is Overdose Awareness Month. This global initiative aims to end overdose, reduce stigma, and honor those who have lost their lives to overdose. It is also a time to recognize the impact of prevention and recovery work in the county.

The Medina County Health Department is constantly working with the community to raise awareness and provide overdose education. Through Project DAWN (Deaths Avoided with Naloxone), trainings are provided to recognize signs and symptoms of an opioid overdose, perform rescue breathing, and learn how to administer naloxone to someone experiencing an opioid overdose.

Naloxone is an antidote administered to reverse an overdose caused by an opioid drug. Naloxone can restore breathing, reverse effects of opioids, and prevent overdose death.

If you are interested in

having your own naloxone on hand in times of emergency, you can get a kit by mail order or in-person pick-up here at the Medina County Health Department. Call 330-723-9688, option 2 for more details.

We also have several naloxone dispensing sites around the county. "NaloxBoxes" are publically accessible distribution boxes that contain a supply of free naloxone kits. They are unlocked and regularly stocked to maintain an available supply. Visit medinahealth.org/naloxone for NaloxBox locations and to order your kit.

3 Back-To-School Tips for Students with Disabilities

It takes work for any parent to successfully get their kids success in the classroom. ready to head back to school and start a new year. But for parents who have children with disabilities, the process of moving from summer to school can be a little more complex. Here are some tips to try to help make it a little easier.

1. Introduce them to the classroom early, meet the teacher and get involved.

If your school has a back-to-school night before classes begin, be sure to attend. If your child needs a more sensory-friendly environment, ask the school if your family can visit the classroom and meet the teacher ahead of time. During this meeting, discuss any goals and concerns you have so that everyone is on the same page if additional situations arise during the year. Keep communication open with everyone involved in your child's education, and it always helps to volunteer for special events and extracurricular activities. If your child is unable to visit the classroom beforehand, ask the teacher to send photos of the classroom, including the cubby or locker with their name on it, their desk, and other relevant areas like the lunchroom. This helps your child become familiar with the space they will be in every day.

2. Practice daily routines before school

All children benefit from getting into a routine as the school year approaches, but children with disabilities may need to start this process two or three weeks in advance. Try doing practice runs where your child gets ready, eats breakfast, and leaves the house as if it were a school day. This can be especially helpful for children with autism or those who experience anxiety about starting school. In addition to waking up and going to bed at a set time, practice sitting down to work on an activity for a set period, such as 15 minutes, and gradually increasing the time. Work on skills such as asking for permission to get up or use the bathroom, washing hands after using the bathroom, and asking an adult for help when

3. Establish social support and stay positive

If you're worried about your child navigating school, consider reaching out to other families with students at the same school, whether or not they have disabilities. They may be willing to help your child at school. Also, check if there is a buddy program available. Encourage your child to create

connections with classmates on the first day, try making goodie bags for the class. This not only fosters kindness but also helps reduce fear among peers and some stress for your child. This may also help quickly establish a social support system for your child. Remember to discuss your child's feelings about school with them and aim to maintain a positive attitude. School can be overwhelming for both parents and children, so open communication is key.

While starting a new school year with a child with disabilities may seem daunting, taking these steps before the school year begins can help everyone feel more prepared, comfortable, and ready for



Ways to Create Celebrations for All!

Birthdays, graduations, holidays and other special occasions are celebrations people look forward to attending. As you plan your next big celebration, don't forget to think about making it accessible for people with disabilities so they also feel welcome and included.

1. Ask Questions

With your invitation, ask guests if there are any things you can do that will improve their visit, including dietary restrictions. This communication beforehand, gives people the chance to speak up about what they need to feel welcome.

2. Adjust Your Space

Make sure your party place is as physically accessible as possible. This could mean renting a ramp for front door steps, or rearranging furniture so people can navigate your space safely. Make sure that everyone is able to reach table tops that hold food, activities, or gifts.

3. Be Mindful of Sensory Input

Celebrations often come with decorations, music, foods, and scents. Experiencing too much of these can be overwhelming for some people with sensory concerns. Flashing lights can cause visual overload, distraction, headaches, and even trigger seizures.

4. Create a Sensory Space

Consider creating a sensory space in a room that is not being used for the celebration. Sensory spaces are where guests can go to take a break from the typical hustle and bustle of a gathering. A child that needs a nap, a person with sensory

concerns, or a new parent with their baby can all benefit from this quiet and relaxing space. Make the space comfortable by using low lighting and provide items like pillows, blankets, fidget toys, or books and magazines.

5. Provide a Remote Option

Whether it is due to a disability, sickness, or not being able to travel, it's





MEDINA, Ohio -- Thanks to a new initiative by the Medina County Board of Developmental Disabilities (MCBDD), access to restroom facilities at county events will be more feasible for individuals with disabilities and mobility issues.

MCBDD has partnered with the fair to provide and fully fund the services of a mobile changing unit, which will be located behind the community center building throughout the fair.

"This is actually the second time we have used it," said Patti Hetkey, MCBDD's community relations manager.

"We had it at the Taste of Wadsworth, and we are committed to getting it out as much as possible at Medina County events free of charge."

Stacey Maleckar, MCBDD superintendent said, "We understand that access to restroom facilities can be a challenge for some individuals and families, including senior citizens, veterans and those with disabilities.

Hetkey said the MCBDD purchased the unit with the help of a grant from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds from the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities

"We know there are families who want to come out and enjoy public events, but this can be a big barrier for certain individuals and their caregivers," Hetkey said.

"We are so happy to have this unit. I think it will be a game changer for a lot of people."

State voters greet VP Harris

WEST ALLIS, Wisconsin — A roaring crowd of battleground state voters greeted Vice President Kamala Harris on Tuesday as she opened her public case against Republican former President Donald Trump by declaring November's election will be "a choice between freedom and chaos.'

"In this campaign, I promise you, I will proudly put my record against his any day of the week," Harris said. "We believe in a future where every person has the opportunity not just to get by, but to get ahead."

Harris arrived in the Milwaukee area having locked up nomination support from Democratic delegates after President Joe Biden dropped his reelection bid on Sunday. It was her first campaign rally since she jumped into the race just two days ago with Biden's endorsement.

The event reflected a vibrancy that had been lacking among Democrats in recent weeks, and Harris was intent on projecting a sense of steady confidence about the November election. She's pulled in \$100 million in donations since Sunday afternoon and on Tuesday picked up the backing of more Democratic officials and political groups, including congressional leaders Charles Schumer and Hakeem Jeffries.

By stopping in Wisconsin, Harris was putting down a marker in one of the "blue wall" states along with Michigan and Pennsylvania that Democrats see as essential for securing a presidential victory.

The visit comes a week after the Republican National Convention wrapped up in the city and as Harris works to sharpen her message against the GOP nominee with just over 100 days until Election Day.

Harris' trip to the state was a sharp contrast to Biden's July 6 visit, when he was trying to reassure Democrats day to the anthem "Freedom" from who frequently deployed the refrain great figure to look up to."

performance in the June 27 debate against Trump. Sen. Tammy Baldwin, who is up for reelection this year, had skipped the Biden event, but she spoke before Harris on Tuesday.

Harris is leaning into her resume as a former district attorney and California attorney general, seeking to draw a contrast with Trump who is the first former president to be convicted of felony crimes.

"She's prepared to meet this moment because she was professionally trained to prosecute a criminal, and unfortunately that's who the Republicans have put forward," said Sen. Laphonza Butler, D-Calif.

Harris strode onto the stage Tueswho were wary after his troubling Beyonce's "Lemonade" album and set during his 2012 reelection fight to

about contrasting herself with Trump.

"I took on perpetrators of all kinds. Predators who abused women. Fraudsters who ripped off consumers. Cheaters who broke the rules for their own gain. So hear me when I say, I know Donald Trump's type," she said.

Harris cast her campaign as a "people first" endeavor, again aiming to draw a contrast with Trump, who she said represented special interests and corporations.

She also portrayed her rival's policies as being antiquated and backward looking. "We are not going back,' she said. "And I'll tell you why we are not going back. Ours is a fight for the future." That echoed Barack Obama

argue against Republican ideas.

Harris' swift ascent over the past few days has required her to vet possible running mates, a process being led by Eric Holder, who was attorney general during Barack Obama's presidency. But her key impact so far has been galvanizing Democrats.

Before the Tuesday speech, Diane Walter, 68, of South Milwaukee said she was thrilled that Harris is the candidate.

"I've been a Democrat my whole life," Walter said. "She's energizing the

diversity we're looking for," he said.

Trump and his campaign have quickly turned most of their focus on Harris and have asserted that they were prepared for the change and it did not alter their plans.

The former president has nicknamed the vice president "Lyin' Kamala Harris," accused her of not being tough enough on crime as a prosecutor and sought to bind her to the administration's policies on the border as he seeks to make immigration a focus of his campaign.

But there are signs that Trump seems to be unhappy about facing the younger vice president rather than making his case against the aging president. Twice since Biden dropped out, Trump has said the planned second presidential debate should not be hosted by ABC News and suggested it be moved to Fox News, which has a perception of being friendlier to him.

Harris' husband, Doug Emhoff, at an appearance in Washington, said he was unimpressed by Trump's attacks, telling reporters Tuesday, "That's all he's got?"

In addition to Baldwin, Harris was joined by major elected officials in Wisconsin, including Gov. Tony Evers, Attorney General Josh Kaul, Secretary of State Sarah Godlewski and Wisconsin Democratic Party Chair Ben

Biden said in a statement that "what happened that day can never happen again," and he planned to appoint a new director soon, but he did not discuss a timeline.

The president and Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas thanked Cheatle for her service. Mayorkas appointed Deputy Director Ronald Rowe as acting director.

He has worked for the agency for 23 years.

"At this moment in time, we must remain focused," Rowe said in a note to staff obtained by AP. "We will restore the faith and confidence of the American public and the people we are entrusted to protect."

Congressional questioning

At the hearing Monday, Cheatle remained defiant that she was the "right person" to lead the Secret Service, even as she said she took responsibility for the failures. When Republican Rep. Nancy Mace suggested Cheatle begin drafting her resignation letter from the hearing room, Cheatle responded, "No, thank you."

The 20-year-old shooter, Thomas Matthew Crooks, was

able to get within 135 meters of the stage where the former president was speaking when he opened fire. That's despite a threat on Trump's life from Iran that led to additional security for the former president in the days before the rally.

Cheatle acknowledged Monday that the Secret Service was told about a suspicious person two to five times before the rally shooting. She also revealed that the roof from which Crooks fired had been identified as a potential vulnerability days earlier. But she failed to answer many questions about what happened, including why there were no agents on the roof.

A bloodied Trump was quickly escorted off the stage by Secret Service agents, and agency snipers killed the shooter. Trump said part of his right ear was pierced in the shooting. One rallygoer was killed, and two others were critically wounded.

Details continue to emerge about signs of trouble that day and the roles of the Secret Service and local authorities. The agency routinely relies on local law enforcement to secure the perimeter of events. Former top Secret Service agents said the gunman should never have been allowed to gain access to the

After Cheatle's resignation, Trump posted on his social media network: "The Biden/ Harris Administration did not properly protect me, and I was forced to take a bullet for Democracy. IT WAS MY GREAT HONOR TO DO SO!"

The House Homeland Security Committee had asked Cheatle to testify Tuesday for another hearing on the assassination attempt, but lawmakers said she refused. Cheatle's name was on a card on a table in front of an empty chair during the hearing, which began shortly before her decision to step down became public.

Investigating an ever-growing number of threats

The Secret Service is a part of the Department of Homeland Security, which includes immigration, transportation security and the Coast Guard. The department was formed after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

A few years ago, there was a movement to shift the agency back to the Treasury Department, where it was housed before Sept. 11, particularly because Homeland Security's intense focus on immigration added to the growing divide between what the Secret Service sees as its dual missions — protecting the president and investigating financial crime — and the mission of its parent department. But

that movement stalled. Roughly half of the Secret Service's \$3 billion budget is spent on protective services. It also has a robust cybercrime division, stateof-the-art forensic labs and a threat-assessment center that studies how to mitigate and train against threats.

With a workforce of 7,800 special agents, uniformed officers and other staff, the Secret Service has investigated an ever-increasing number of threats against the president and other officials under its protection. It has also managed a growing number of high-profile government figures asking for support. Staffing has not kept pace with the workload increase. Around Sept. 11 there were about 15 full-time protectees. That number has now more than doubled.

Trump is the first modern ex-president to seek another term, and because of his high visibility, his protective detail has always been larger than some others. That protective bubble got tighter in recent months as he drew closer to the nomination. All major party nominees are granted enhanced details with counterassault and countersniper teams similar to the

president.

Calls for accountability

There were calls for accountability across the political spectrum, with congressional committees immediately moving to investigate and issuing subpoenas. Top Republican leaders from both the House and the Senate said

Cheatle should step down. Biden, a Democrat, ordered an independent review into security at the rally, and the Secret Service's inspector general opened an investigation. The agency is also reviewing its countersniper team's "preparedness and operations."

On Tuesday, Republican House Speaker Mike Johnson said Cheatle's resignation was "overdue."

"Now we have to pick up the pieces. We have to rebuild the American people's faith and trust in the Secret Service as an agency," Johnson said.

Meanwhile, Sens. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, and Catherine Cortez Masto, D-Nev., introduced legislation Tuesday to require Senate confirmation of future Secret Service directors.

Cheatle served in the Secret Service for 27 years. She left in 2021 for a job as a security executive at PepsiCo before Biden asked her to return in 2022 to head the agency.

She took over amid a controversy over missing text messages from around the time thousands of Trump supporters stormed the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021, following his 2020 election loss

to Biden. During her time at the agency, Cheatle was the first woman to be named assistant director of protective operations, the division that protects the president and other dignitaries, where she oversaw a \$133.5 million budget. She was the second woman to lead the agency.

When Biden announced Cheatle's appointment, he said she had served on his detail when he was vice president and he and his wife "came to trust her judgment and counsel."

the then-newly acquired Pittsburgh and Western Railroad

In order to make that section a part of the Baltimore and Ohio's direct route to Chicago, an entirely new stretch of railroad had to be built from Akron to Willard, Ohio, where the Chicago Junction sat. This was completed in 1893 and passed through Lodi and over the West Fork of the East Branch of the Black

"The significance of the masonry structure used instead of fabricated steel is illuminated by the commentary on the similar Brandywine Viaduct at Wilmington, Delaware, completed after 1910," the NARA said.

The bridge was built during a period when the

governing bodies of the railroads inclined to favor the stone arch for use in permanent bridge structures

"The new Wilmington bridge became a stone-arch structure from end to end and one of the handsomest ever built in America .. it typified the highest ideals of bridge construction; of all time or place. . the Wilmington Bridge is one of the very few in the United States built for all time and for all conditions of service," the NRDB continued, comparing the Black River Viaduct to a well-known span in Delaware. "These general conclusions apply to the Black River viaduct as well, even though it consists of three spans instead of

Tanting to start something in the world of musical theater for more than half of his life, Jahir L. Hipps remembers people crying the day Michael Jackson died.
